


How to get around

Traveling within Amsterdam by public transport is straightforward and convenient. The extensive network is operated by GVB and connects the city's neighbourhoods by train, tram, metro, bus, and ferry. **Please note:** GVB's public transport network

is cashless. You can only purchase a ticket or check in with a debit or credit card.

The <u>public transport chip card (OV-</u> <u>Chipkaart</u>) is a rechargeable card used for travel on trams, buses, metros, and trains. You can purchase a non-personalized card at GVB ticket machines, GVB Tickets & Info offices, and select newsstands and supermarkets.



Tram

There is a reliable and frequent tram service across Amsterdam (except for Amsterdam-Noord), with many routes terminating at Central Station. It is easy to check in and out with a public transport chip card (OV-Chipkaart) at the start and end of your journeys (including when you change trams). Alternatively, it is possible to purchase a 1, 24 or 48-hour ticket aboard most trams using a credit or debit card.

Bus

Amsterdam's extensive bus network connects all neighbourhoods with other city areas and extends into the Amsterdam Metropolitan Area. Just like for trams, you can check in and out with a public transport chip card or purchase tickets directly from the driver using a debit or credit card.

Metro

Amsterdam's metro system radiates from Central Station to the city's outlying districts. Its four routes are often the fastest way to reach districts like Bijlmer, Amstelveen and Diemen. Metro stations are gated by checkin and check-out ports, accessible only with a (OV-Chipkaart) or another valid travel card.

Ferry

Amsterdam's ferries provide essential, free connections for pedestrians, cyclists and mopeds across the River IJ towards Amsterdam Noord. The most popular and best-served ferry route is from Amsterdam Central Station to Buiksloterweg. This route is also served throughout the night.

Train

Trains provide superb connections with Amsterdam Airport Schiphol, but also different parts of the city, other Dutch towns and cities, plus direct connections with Belgium, France and Germany. Amsterdam Central Station is the primary station, providing quick access to the city centre and public transport network. Tickets can be purchased from the yellow ticket machines or customer service desks at stations.



Unique sights and things to do

With world-class museums, quirky festivals, theatre, live music, laid-back bars and delightful restaurants, there's never a shortage of things to do in Amsterdam!

Van Gogh Museum

Truly a must-visit for Van Gogh fans, here you'll find the largest collection of his work in the world with 200 of his paintings, 400 drawings and 700 letters. In addition to the curation of Van Gogh's masterpieces, there are also rotating exhibitions and works by his contemporaries including Monet and Pissarro and later artists who were inspired by Van Gogh, including Steven Aalders and Zeng Fanzhi.

Neighbourhoods to wander:

The waterways, bridges and bicycles of Amsterdam's historic centre are iconic but venture further in any direction outside of the canal ring, and you'll find a whole world more to explore.

De Pijp

Westergas
